	Agenda Summary
Background	In September 2021, while excavating near CRW's 36-inch diameter concrete cylinder water main for private utility installation at 9812 SE Empire Ct, the contractor Mesa Contracting encountered the subject pipe. CRW had previously provided utility locates and other information indicating the pipe was in the area; however, when the contractor exposed the pipe, rather than contacting CRW to confirm next steps, the contractor elected to begin chipping into the water pipe. The resulting damage required a leak repair taking several days.
	After repair, staff assessed the effectiveness of the repaired pipe section and its long-term integrity given the damage sustained. While the pipe repair has enabled the pipe to remain in service, given that this is a critical large-diameter water main feeding the Mather Reservoir, and considering the material and age of the pipe, it was advised to seek a claim wherein the at-fault contractor would pay for not only the immediate repair costs (which were approximately \$7,200), but also contribute an amount to an assessed value for future pipe replacement.

ANALYSIS

Over the past 2 years, CRW has engaged legal counsel to review the issues, draft and file damages claim, and negotiate a settlement agreement with the Contractor. Recently, negotiations have yielded settlement terms that in the opinion of legal counsel and staff constitute a satisfactory resolution to the issue. After negotiations, the Contractor has agreed to pay a settlement amount of \$45,000.00. The Settlement Agreement, provided in Exhibit A, captures the terms and conditions between the parties.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Approve the Settlement Agreement with Mesa Contracting, Inc., including accepting the settlement payment of \$45,000.00.

EXHIBIT A

RELEASE AND HOLD HARMLESS AGREEMENT

PARTIES

This Release and Hold Harmless Agreement ("Agreement") is made and entered between and among the following parties:

- i. CLACKAMAS RIVER WATER, a Regional Water Service Provider organized under Chapter 264 of the Oregon Revised Statutes as a special district (hereinafter "CRW"); and,
- ii. MESA CONTRACTING, LLC, an Oregon limited liability company and its agents, representatives, past, present and future officers, directors, shareholders, employees, parents, subsidiaries, affiliates, partners, members, managers, attorneys, third-party administrators, successors, assigns and insurers, including but not limited to Sentry Insurance (hereinafter "Mesa").

RECITALS

- i. On or about September 20, 2021, while performing work in the area of SE 98th Court and SE Empire Court in Clackamas, Oregon, Mesa caused damage to a 36" concrete cylinder water main pipe (hereinafter "the Incident.")
- ii. In an attempt to recover alleged damages resulting from the Incident, CRW filed a lawsuit in Clackamas County Circuit Court entitled *Clackamas River Water v. Mesa Contracting, LLC,* Case No. 23CV23665 (hereinafter "the Lawsuit").
- iii. CRW and Mesa have determined it is in their best interests to resolve all claims defenses that could be raised between them relating to the Incident and in the Lawsuit and therefore enter into the following Release and Settlement Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the terms, conditions and promises set forth herein, it is hereby agreed as follows:

TERMS AND SETTLEMENT

1. Warranty of Claim Ownership

CRW represents and warrants that it alone owns the right to pursue, and has not made any assignment of, any actual or potential claims against Mesa arising from the Incident and/or that were or could have been raised in the Lawsuit.

2. Payment

In consideration for CRW's release of claims in paragraph 3 below, Sentry Insurance, on behalf of its insured Mesa, will pay the sum of Forty Five Thousand dollars and zero cents (\$45,000.00). Said payment will be made payable to "Harrang Long, PC Client Trust Account.

3. Release

Except for the obligations of this Agreement, in consideration for the payment described in Paragraph 2 above, CRW fully releases Mesa from all claims arising from the Incident and/or the facts and allegations raised in the pleadings filed in the Lawsuit, whether or not asserted in the Lawsuit, and whether known or unknown. This release extends to all damages arising from the Incident of any kind or nature, including but not limited to, all claims arising under any federal, state or local law, common law, public policy, statute or otherwise, and all damages which have been and may hereafter be sustained by CRW as a result of the Incident.

4. Indemnification and Hold Harmless

In further consideration for the payment described in Paragraph 2 above, CRW agrees to protect, indemnify, and hold harmless Mesa against any and all claims, demands, liabilities or other obligations asserted by non-parties to this Agreement for damages occurring before the date of this Agreement which are alleged to have resulted from the Incident.

5. Dismissal of Pending Lawsuit

Within seven days after receiving payment of the funds described in paragraph 2 above, CRW agrees to authorize its attorney to sign a Stipulated General Judgment of Dismissal dismissing the Lawsuit with prejudice and without costs or disbursements being allowed to any party.

6. Settlement in Full

CRW agrees that acceptance of the amount set forth above constitutes a full accord and satisfaction of all disputed claims, and that payment of said amount is not to be construed as an admission of liability upon the part of Mesa. CRW fully understands that there are no other collateral agreements between the parties hereto, and that all prior promises and negotiations are merged herein.

8. No Admission of Liability

CRW acknowledges that this settlement is a compromise settlement of disputed claims and that Mesa, by settling this matter, is not making any admission of liability. CRW does not dispute Mesa's position that CRW's claims are being settled to avoid the risks and costs of further litigation.

9. Severability

If any provision of this Release is adjudicated to be unenforceable or voided for any reason, that part will be severed, and the balance of the agreement will remain valid and enforceable.

10. Waiver Of Rule of Construction Against Drafter

CRW acknowledges that it has had an opportunity to participate in the drafting of this Agreement. Any rule of construction that would otherwise require ambiguities in this agreement to be interpreted against the drafter(s) is hereby expressly waived.

12. Governing Law

CRW acknowledges that this Agreement has been negotiated and entered into in the State of Oregon. In the event there is a dispute concerning this Agreement, the parties expressly agree that the dispute shall be governed by, interpreted under, construed, and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of Oregon and the Oregon Rules of Civil Procedure and Evidence.

13. Complete Understanding

CRW hereby declares that the terms of this Agreement have been completely read and are fully understood and voluntarily accepted for the purpose of making a full and final settlement of any and all claims, disputed or otherwise, on account of injuries and/or damages related to the claims arising from the Incident, and for the express purpose of precluding forever any further additional claims against Mesa arising out of the Incident.

A. Management Report

1. Communications:

Monthly Report – The monthly report will be provided to the Board separately and posted on the CRW Website.

- 2. Riverside Park Maintenance Agreement Grant CRW participates in a Maintenance Agreement Grant program (MAG) through the Oregon State Marine Board to help offset dollars spent to maintain Riverside Park while making it accessible to recreational boating. This program is funded from title and registration fees paid by motorized boat owners. CRW qualifies for the \$7,400 grant because the boat ramp at Riverside Park is accessible to the public.
- 3. Special Districts Insurance Services (SDIS) Best Practices Survey - Annually CRW staff complete the SDIS Best Practices Survey to earn up to a 10% credit on our insurance premiums. The SDIS Best Practices Program was designed to assist special districts with implementing best practices to mitigate risk in areas of high exposure. The focus of this year's survey was emergency preparedness. CRW is pleased to report that we met all the criteria and will receive the full 10% credit on our general liability, auto liability and property insurance premiums for 2024.
- 4. Emergency Equipment Drill On September 26, the Regional Water Providers Consortium (RWPC) held an Emergency Equipment Drill at Riverside Park. Water Providers in the region came together to operate different types of water treatment and distribution equipment. Thank you to the various CRW staff who worked on the planning, preparing, and operating of the CRW equipment. Special thanks to Beth McGinnis, CRW Emergency Manager, for her participation in the coordinating committee.

5. Clackamas River Water Providers (CRWP)- The CRWP Board met on October 4, to receive informational updates. The presentations included an update from the Clackamas River Basin Council (CRBC)- who shared information about pesticide reduction efforts in the Clackamas Basin. In addition, a presentation on Emergency Power Resiliency along with CRWP program updates were shared.

The CRWP also held a meeting to check in on emergency management activities. Beth McGinnis was able to provide updates on the progress on the CRWP catastrophic earthquake response planning grant project.

- 6. Regional Water Providers Consortium (RWPC) Board Meeting - On October 4 the RWPC Board met both in-person and hybrid. Business items included the selection of the "at-large" Executive Committee members, review final draft of the RWPC Strategic Plan, provide final approval of the RWPC Intergovernmental Agreement (IGA), discuss the FY 2024-2025 budget, and receive RWPC reports. The RWPC Intergovernmental Agreement will require all the RWPC members' approval. CRW will include the agreement on a future CRW Board meeting agenda.
- 7. Special Districts Association of Oregon (SDAO) Metro Breakfast - After a three-year hiatus, SDAO sponsored the networking event to bring together various districts to discuss issues and items that might be unique to the Metro area. This session focused on housing issues and their impact on districts that provide urban services. The Governor's Housing Policy Advisor provided an overview of the Governor's three executive orders and the work that is being conducted to meet those goals. Those districts in attendance indicated a desire to continue to meet to have an opportunity to exchange ideas, share challenges and bring in policy makers that impact districts.
- Emergency Management Update A focus has been working on improving water utility presence and notification pathways for HazMat incidents in the watershed with public safety partners. CRW will be participating in the Great ShakeOut (duck, cover, hold) and evacuation drill and staff accounting exercise in October 2023.
- 9. Safety Update Safety Committee continues to meet with the support of WHA's Jeff Griffin. Beth continues to monitor the annual training plan, conduct new employee training, coordinate incident follow-up, schedule specialty trainings, and consult on safety improvements to our operations.

- 10. Security Update Conducted a major improvement in CRW's security by converting all locks at admin, WTP, and SysOps to a commercially supported system. Completed contracting with EcamSecure to begin project planning for digital access control conversion. Continued partnership with VCA on the related items with the above activities
- 11. **Purchase-Card Rebate** We continued to collect quarterly rebates associated with our participation in a state purchasing card program with US Bank. The most recent rebate was \$1,200.

Regulatory

All 73 samples collected and analyzed for the September monitoring period showed no presence of coliform/*E. coli* bacteria.

Cyanotoxin Testing

Microcystin and Cylindrospermopsin sampling of our raw water began in May and occurs every two weeks through October for compliance, and the samples are analyzed at our in-house accredited laboratory.

No cyanotoxins have been detected in our raw water.

Non-Regulatory

General water quality parameters (pH, temperature, chlorine, TDS, hardness, alkalinity) were collected throughout the distribution system at 16 locations in the North and South systems.

Monthly watershed sampling was conducted at 4 long-term sampling locations for total organic carbon, nutrients (nitrate/nitrite, total phosphorus, orthophosphate, etc.), coliform density, pH, dissolved oxygen, TDS, and temperature.

Weekly algae monitoring is occurring at 3 locations in the North Fork Reservoir and CRW's intakes. This work includes species monitoring with the FlowCAM and nutrient analysis.

River Conditions Reports

• The current Clackamas River **7-day average streamflow is 100% of normal** (median).

- September **precipitation in the Clackamas basin was 114% of normal.** Precipitation for the water year (October 1 September 20) was 70% of normal
- September 30) was 79% of normal.

• The three-month outlook Oct-Dec) from the NOAA Climate Prediction Center calls for a likely chance of **above** normal temperatures, and a slightly elevated chance of **below-normal precipitation** for northwest Oregon.

CRWP Members - Who Are We?

The Clackamas River Water Providers is made-up of eight municipal water providers on the Clackamas River which serve over 300,000 people drinking water in Clackamas and Washington Counties. Participation in the organization is voluntary and is funded through membership dues. While the Clackamas River Water Providers projects and staff are jointly funded each organization retains its own individual autonomy.

City of Estacada

The City of Estacada is located at the base of the Clackamas River



Gorge and the Mt. Hood National Forest and serves a population of 5,347 people from the Clackamas River. The Estacada treatment facility treats, pumps, and stores water for domestic, commercial and firefighting purposes, both inside and outside of the city limits. The primary goal of the drinking water treatment plant is to meet or exceed water quality standards to remain in full compliance with state and federal regulations, while providing adequate quantity and pressure for firefighting.

The design capacity of the treatment plant is 2 million gallons of drinking water per day (MGD). Currently the city has four reservoirs and are working to add a 5th reservoir. For more information, visit the **City of Estacada here**.

City of Tigard

The City of Tigard, located in Washington County, provides water to 60,000 residents in Durham, King City, two-thirds of Tigard, and the Tigard Water District. Through the Lake Oswego/Tigard Water Partnership the City of Tigard's main source of drinking water comes



from the Clackamas River, one of the highest quality sources in the state.

Water is withdrawn from the Clackamas River, pumped through a pipeline buried beneath the Willamette River, and treated at the Lake Oswego-Tigard Water Treatment Plant in West Linn. The water goes through a robust treatment process that includes filtration to remove dirt and organisms, ozone to remove substances that affect how the water tastes and smells, and disinfection to kill organisms and protect the water as it goes through the distribution system.For more information visit **City of Tigard**. or **LO-Tigard Water**.

City of Lake Oswego

The Lake Oswego – Tigard Water Treatment Plant serves a combined 100,000 people in Lake Oswego and Tigard. The water source originates from the Clackamas River Basin. Once withdrawn from the Clackamas River, the water



is pumped through a pipeline buried beneath the Willamette River to the City's Water Treatment Plant located in West Linn.

Completed in 2017, the water treatment plant utilizes a stateof-the-art water treatment process, known as conventional filtration plus ozone. When raw (untreated) water reaches the plant from the Clackamas River, state-licensed drinking water operators take the water through a purification process that makes it safe to drink. Clackamas River Water

Clackamas River Water (CRW) is a regional water service provider organized under Chapter 264 of the Oregon Revised Statutes (ORS) as a special district. Special Districts are



autonomous government entities that are accountable to the voters in the areas they serve. CRW provides clean, safe drinking water to a population of about 50,000 directly, and up to 80,000 people are served when the populations of wholesale

customers are included. CRW has maintained more than 45 years of exceptional water treatment plant operation, providing water to nearly 12,000 service connections, and maintaining a distribution system consisting of approximately 262 miles of pipeline, 15 reservoirs, and 11 pump stations.

CRW was created in July 1995 by the consolidation of the Clackamas Water District and the Clairmont Water District. Clackamas Water District was originally formed in 1926. It absorbed the former Stanley Water District in 1979 and merged with Barwell Park Water District in 1991. Clairmont was originally formed in 1959 and was merged with the Redland and Holcomb-Outlook Water Districts in 1983. For more information, visit CRW's website by clicking HERE.

City of Gladstone

The City of Gladstone maintains three reservoirs, two pump stations, and approximately 40 miles of water



pipe within its distribution system. The city serves a population of over 12,000 people, in 4 sq miles at the confluence of the Clackamas River and the Willamette River and consumes an average of 1.2 million gallons of drinking water a day (MGD). The city also has ownership in the North Clackamas County Water Commission treatment plant which treats water from the Clackamas River. For more information visit <u>City of Gladstone</u>.

Oak Lodge Water Services

OLWS provides safe and reliable drinking water services to



approximately 33,000 residential and commercial customers in the Oak Grove/Jennings Lodge communities, within 9 square miles. Raw water from the Clackamas River is drawn by the North Clackamas County Water Commission (NCCWC) Water Treatment Plant, where it is treated, cleaned, and transformed into high-quality drinking water. OLWS operates and maintains a complex set of infrastructure responsible for storing and distributing drinking water to its customers. For more information visit Oak Lodge Water Services.

Sunrise Water Authority (Happy Valley and Damascus area)

The Sunrise Water Authority was formed in 2000 as part of a merger between the former Mt. Scott and Damascus Water



Districts. Sunrise Water Authority is governed by a sevenmember elected Board and currently serves a population of approximately 53,000 through 17,500 service connections located throughout the City of Happy and surrounding areas of unincorporated Clackamas County. Sunrise's system is composed of 260 miles of pipe and 13 reservoirs with a total combined capacity of 23.6 million gallons. Water supplied to their customers is derived principally from the Clackamas River via its ownership in the North Clackamas County Water Commission and through wholesale purchases from the Clackamas River Water District, with supplemental peak demand supplies from several area wells. South Fork Water Board (Oregon City and West Linn)

South Fork Water Board is a water treatment plant that treats water from the Clackamas River and is jointly owned by the Cities of



Oregon City and West Linn. In addition to selling water to Oregon City and West Linn, South Fork provides water to other unincorporated parts of Clackamas County, providing water to approximately 64,000 people in the area.

South Fork's current system includes the water intake just off Clackamas River Drive, a pipeline up the hill from the river to the site of the water treatment plant, a transmission pipeline from the treatment plant to Oregon City and West Linn distribution connections, and a pump station to boost treated water to higher elevations. The treatment plant capacity is approximately 23 million gallons per day (MGD), and the peak day to date is approximately 20 MGD during the summer of 2023. Source Water Protection

Source water protection is one of the keystones of what the CRWP does and is the foundation of any drinking water utility and is one of the primary ways to reduce the risk to a source from contamination or decline in production. Source water protection not only helps the utility identify its risk, but it is also necessary to educate regulatory agencies, permitting authorities, and the community about the impacts their actions can have on drinking water source water quality or quantity.

Source Water Protection is one of the first key steps in a multiple barrier approach to providing clean drinking water which involves several consecutive steps, including: high quality source water, source water protection, optimized water treatment, distribution system maintenance and water quality monitoring.

Source water protection can also:

• Reduce the need for additional treatment to meet water quality standards.

• Help the utility be prepared and reduce the impacts and costs of an emergency when they understand the risks to source quality from contamination, or reduced quantity due to climate change.

• Help sustainability when an alternate source of water may not be available or cost-prohibitive.

Hazardous Material Spill Prevention Program

The CRWP has identified hazardous materials spills as being a high-risk factor that could affect drinking water quality in the Clackamas River watershed. Potential spills from commercial and industrial areas, railroad lines, transportation activities along I-205, HWY 26 (crosses North Fork of Deep Creek near the junction of HWY 26 and 212), HWY 211 and HWY 212/224, and road bridges crossing the Clackamas River are of particular concern.

The Clackamas Industrial Area is one area of concern because many of the businesses are less than a quarter of a mile away from the Clackamas River with a large number of stormwater drains as well as four small tributary creeks (Rock, Sieben, Carli, and Cow Creeks) that drain the Industrial Area directly to the river.

These stormwater drains and tributaries enter the river just upstream of four drinking water intakes. Therefore, when chemicals spill on a property or street, it can travel quickly to the river.

The CRWP continues to work with Pollution Prevention Resource Center (PPRC), a nonprofit organization that is one of the Northwest's leading sources of high quality, unbiased pollution prevention information, to help implement both our technical and financial assistance for spill prevention efforts to businesses located within the Clackamas Industrial area.

This includes 1) free facility site visits to help businesses identify environmental best practices, assist with spill

response plans, and identify secondary containment options, and 2) the purchase and/or installation of secondary containment equipment. Equipment may include spill pallets, double-walled tanks, repairs to floor drains, installation of shutoff valves, and construction of berms and waste cover.

The CRWP is also offering free spill kits to every facility within the Clackamas Industrial area. Facilities interested in receiving free spill prevention tools and secondary containment systems must complete a free facility site visit to identify the best options for the facility.

How Water Systems Work Drinking Distribution Systems Water

Our water systems have hundreds of miles of transmission, distribution and service lines, hundreds of valves and fire hydrants, reservoirs and pumping stations which move water from our treatment plants to homes, offices and industries in our service areas. These systems allow our CRWP members to provide an uninterrupted supply of pressurized safe drinking water to their consumers.

As these systems age, deterioration can occur due to corrosion, materials erosion, and external pressures that result in water main breaks, storage tank leaks, water pressure fluctuation, and other situations that can pose intermittent or persistent health risks.

Therefore, these systems need to be maintained yearround to ensure delivery of high-quality drinking water. This is largely done through the <mark>continuous</mark> operation and maintenance of the system facilities and includes both preventive and corrective maintenance.

Preventive Maintenance is maintenance that is specifically scheduled, while Corrective Maintenance is not scheduled but is done when a problem, such as a main break, must be corrected to continue satisfactory operation. Some examples of ongoing operation and maintenance programs include: Water Main Flushing programs, Leak Detection programs, and Meter Maintenance programs.

Watershed Protection: Sources of Pollution

The CRWP offers an **Activity Book** that teachers can use to help inform students about the importance and value of clean water, and how to protect this precious resource. It includes many cool games, puzzles, and activities to become more familiar with the Clackamas River Watershed where we get our high quality drinking water.

Each time it rains or snows, pollutants wash off our roofs, lawns, streets, and parking lots and flow untreated into creeks and rivers. This is called stormwater runoff or non-point source pollution, and is one of the biggest sources of pollution in our watershed. These pollutants include nutrients from garden fertilizers, bacteria from pet waste and litter, soil erosion, pesticides, and runoff from parking lots.

Time to Shut-Off Your Outdoor Irrigation Systems

Summer is over, the days are shorter, nights are longer, and it is beginning to be much cooler. All of the plants are going into their dormant stage which means they do not need any supplemental water. For those of you who let your lawns go dormant during the summer and did not water (thank you), you are beginning to see your lawns turn green again.

The <u>Weekly Watering Number</u> has ended and if you haven't already done so, it is time to shut off the outside water, disconnect and insulate the hose bibs, and shut off and drain your outdoor irrigation systems before the first winter freeze.

Putting Your Irrigation System to Bed for the Winter

Water left in the pipes of your irrigation system can freeze over winter, causing damage to the entire system. You owe it to yourself to make an annual habit of winterizing your irrigation system. That means removing the remaining water from the pipes so there's nothing to expand when temperatures dip down below freezing.

There are three basic methods for draining water from your irrigation system. Which method you should use will depend on the type of irrigation system you have.

Manual Valve Systems

Some irrigation systems are equipped with manual drainage that allows you to empty excess water from the system by simply opening a valve. If you have such a system, shut off the supply of water to the system, look for the manual valves at the ends and low points of the piping. Open all of the valves and drain the water from the system, including the backflow assembly.

Automatic Valve Systems

Other irrigation systems are equipped with valves that will automatically drain water out of the pipes if pressure falls below a certain number of pounds per square inch (PSI). These can be activated by turning off the water supply and briefly running one of the sprinkler heads to relieve the water pressure in the system. You may still need to drain the water between the shut off valve and the backflow assembly. If the sprinkler heads are equipped with check valves, you will need to empty those separately.

Irrigation System Blow-Out

The final method of winterizing your irrigation system is to force compressed air through the system to discharge excess water through the sprinkler heads. This method is potentially hazardous, both to the wrong types of irrigation systems and to anyone who attempts to do this without taking the proper safety precautions. If you've never worked with compressed air or have not blown-out an irrigation system, we highly recommend you hire a licensed landscape professional for assistance.

Winterizing your irrigation system is a critical part of annual irrigation system maintenance. It can save you from having to pay for the repair of costly leaks and water line breaks in the spring. Visit our **website** for more water conservation tips and information.

Fall Water Conservation Tips

The temperature has begun to drop, the days are shorter and the birds are starting to fly south. All of this means one thing, fall is on the way. We strongly urge consumers to conserve water as you begin preparations for the cold months ahead.

Ways you can conserve and live a water-wise lifestyle:

• Sweep patios, driveways and sidewalks. Never hose paved surfaces.

• Know where your Emergency water shut-off valve is located and teach everyone in your household where it is and how to turn off the water. Most shut-off valves are located in the crawl space, basement, garage, or outside near the foundation of a single-family home. If a pipe burst inside your home during the winter, this valve will turn the water off.

• Take your car to a carwash that recycles the water.

• Disconnect and drain hoses from outside faucets and turn them off if they have their own shut-off valve. The shut-off valve is typically located in the basement or crawl space. If your home has an outdoor faucet shut-off valve, be sure to empty the water lines to your faucet by turning on each outdoor faucet after you've closed the shut-off valve. Insulate each spigot with a foam cap or another insulating material like newspaper. If our home does not have a seperate shut-off vlave for the outsode faucets, again, insulate each spigot with a foam cap or another insulationg material like newspaper.

• Make a stronger commitment to water conservation inside the home by turning off the water when brushing your teeth or shaving, and take only 5-minute showers. Also, never pour water down the drain if there is another use for it such as watering a plant or cleaning around the home.

Preparing Your Garden for a Long Winter Nap

Putting the garden to bed for the winter is mostly a matter of cleaning up and covering up. As fall progresses and temperatures drop, those plants that aren't killed outright by frost prepare for dormancy.

Clear out the blackened stems and foliage of annual flowers and vegetables to prevent the possibility of their harboring disease pathogens and insect eggs over the winter. The cool weather is a good time to make a cold frame, dig and box in raised beds, and make general repairs.



While it appears as if all activity in the garden has stopped, there's a lot going on under the soil until it freezes. Newly transplanted trees and shrubs, perennials, and hardy bulbs are all growing roots, drawing on soil nutrients and moisture around them. Earthworms and various microbes in the soil are still processing the organic material they're finding.

Most likely, the organic mulch you spread to protect and retain the soil moisture during the summer months has substantially decomposed. It's so important to spread new mulch now. A thick layer of mulch will feed and protect plants and soil over the winter months. The idea is not so much to keep the soil warm as it is to keep the temperature even.

A little work in the garden now will give extra nutritional and water conservation benefits to your lawn and garden next spring and summer.

By providing your contact information as a county resident you can opt-in to receive critical emergency messaging via email, phone call and text during times of disaster. Important messages that could be relayed include notices to evacuate, shelter-in-place, shelter locations and other extremely important information. Thu Sep 28, 2023 (hybrid-lbg online)

Regular meeting Convened meeting at 5:30 PM. Approved agenda; approved minutes of Jun 22, 2023 meeting; approved consent agenda as follows: Jun/Jul/Aug 2023 checks, appointment of legal counsel of record (Cable Huston, LLC), appointment of Insurance agent of record (Brown & Brown, Inc.).

Board discussion: Election of officers for Fy 2023-2024/Master Plan and CIP update/Emergency pipeline restoration update

New Officers are Paul Gornick, Chair; Chris Hawes, Vice-Chair

Master Plan update Present plant capacity is about 18 MGD. Projected 20-year peak day demand for members is about 9 MGD for Oak lodge and Gladstone, and about 21 MGD for Sunrise. Transmission capacity to Sunrise limits its draw to about 10 MGD, however, with the remainder served through contracts with CRW, or their wells. For the foreseeable future NCCWC should provide a stable supply to Gladstone and Oak Lodge, with additional water to serve Sunrise.

The 20-year capital improvement plan includes renewing slow sand beds in 2024-25, intake upgrades in 2026, replacement of membranes in 2027, and the addition of on-site chlorination in 2028. This activity will be followed by on-going equipment replacement and facility repair, including seismic upgrades in 2029-2033. The estimated total cost in 2023 dollars is about \$19M. Funding strategy includes mainly plant reserves, and some portion from unreturned "true up" funds held in reserve each FY. It appears that NCCWC is on track to adequately fund its future capital needs. A final version of the plan will be presented in January.

Emergency pipeline restoration update NCCWC is working with RH2 Engineering regarding documentation of the abandoned LO raw water pipeline under the Willamette River, turned over to NCCWC, and being considered as a future emergency intertie across the river.

Received YTD production and financial statements, Gail Stevens, finance Director.

May: 299 MG produced/purchased; includes 89 MG purchased from CRW

Jun: 458 MG produced/purchased; includes 86 MG purchased from CRW.

Jul: 532 MG produced/purchased; includes 96 MG purchased from CRW.

Received Operations Report, Joe Rogers, Plant Supervisor

NCCWC welcomed a new operator, Nam Ngo, previously with Joint Water Commission. Working with SWA engineers regarding the final slow sand filter sand replacement, hoping to start in January 2024. Performing routine maintenance on the membrane units in preparation for the sand replacement.

Received General Manager Report, Wade Hathhorn

Noted that the Water Watch suit had ended in denial of requested review of Clackamas

water permits, after 17 years, and this marks the implementation of in stream flow requirement of 650 CFS at the USGS gage at Oregon City. Reviewed process for water release from Timothy Lake, i.e., request release by PGE in consult with ODFW, and consider fish spawning activity, approximately commencing in October. Reported snowpack is off to an early start and has remained around historical medians. February, however, was relatively dry, although snowpack remains on track.

Convened Contract Review Board meeting Three bids for second phase of sand renewal were received, all close, around \$2M. The price for the NSF-specified sand from Knife River was much higher than for the first sand replacement, \$165/ton. They are not ready to accept any of the bids because of this. Looking into remedies, Knife River, at their Willamette river plant south of Champoeg Park, is the sole source for the commodity.

Regional Water Providers Consortium Board Meeting 10/04/2023 6:30-8:30pm

Bob Rubitschun filling in for Naomi Angier (previous commitment). I attended via zoom conferencing. Also, Todd Heidgerken attended the meeting via zoom.

This meeting was a return to "live" meetings following the COVID-19 Pandemic but was offered in a hybrid format with some members in-person and others attending via Zoom conferencing. It appeared that most members attended via zoom conferencing as the in-person attendees were sparely gathered around a table in a large conference room.

The meeting format was much less formal than a CRW Board Meeting—no pledge of allegiance and much less structured call to start the meeting, conduct business and to close the meeting.

Introductions with a topic of sharing a personal experience of a time when you encountered a natural disaster. Members shared experiences with floods, hurricanes, tornados, volcano eruptions, wind storms, earthquakes, forest fires, etc. Their tales revealed the importance of being prepared for the unexpected. Actions by both professionals and everyday people made a huge difference in surviving the natural disaster and the eventual outcome. This was a very appropriate exercise and one that CRW might want to consider as part of our board meeting when covering topics of preparedness.

No public comments

Two members were nominated and approved for At-large Executive Committee members. One additional person expressed an interest and will discuss the commitment outside this meeting.

Strategic Plan was in final draft form but not ready for a final vote. Solicited more input.

Sunrise stated that they were in the 2nd year in their program for rate relief for low income. There's some discussion at the state level and it's becoming part of the political narrative. The consortium doesn't control rates and there's no imminent statewide mandates. This was a "heads up" statement.

Final IGA approved and looking for adoption by the member organizations. Goal is to have Consortium members approve and adoption IGA amendments by June, 2024. Current IGA is active until it goes through all member boards. Next focus will be to update the by-laws.

2024-2025 Budget. Surplus (\$125,000) from slower than expected spending. Increase costs for next budget cycle and the addition of new initiatives. Expected increase in dues is 6%. Would like to get feedback from member organizations if this is acceptable.
